It is my very great pleasure, for the first time as Chair, to introduce the Annual Report of Auckland Foundation for 2018/19.

This has been a year of change; but our momentum and focus have resulted in a number of highlights, and positioned us well to build on our efforts to encourage. grow and celebrate generosity for our community.

Among the year's highlights has been the growth of Auckland Foundation's funds under management, as well as the \$1 million we have granted to approximately 120 grassroots charities.

A benefit of change is the opportunity it gives us to reflect, and the Board have been working to review and reset our strategic plan to 2024.

Core to our value proposition remains the strong donorled service that makes philanthropy easy, effective and impactful. To support this, we recognise how important it is for us to demonstrate thought leadership and identify issues that are important both to our community and to our donors.

A perfect example is the Women's Fund, which absolutely represents the spirit of a community foundation and has been a big focus for Auckland Foundation this year. Supporting women who are working to push through the barriers and create positive change, it was fabulous to

see 42 women community leaders and change makers come together to learn and connect during the Women's Fund Retreat Day, and 10 of those women also receive a grant. There is now a unique opportunity to leverage the successes of the Women's Fund to date, and we are working with our stakeholders to see how this can best be achieved.

Another issue we will be focusing on moving forward is the regeneration of the Hauraki Gulf - our city's treasure. We are looking to partner with our peers working to improve the health of the Gulf, and encourage Aucklanders to support the vital work that needs to be done.

We are well-positioned to continue our momentum into 2024, and beyond. We are extremely grateful to have the ongoing support and sponsorship of Auckland Council, as well as our friends across the charitable community we would not be growing our impact without your support and generosity.

And on behalf of the Board, thank you to the wonderful team and generous donors who make our community foundation.

MORE THAN JUST A FUNDING RELATIONSHIP

Philanthropists Lee and Penny Stevens have supported a number of arts-related projects and organisations through the Rua and Clarrie Stevens Charitable Trust, established in memory of Lee's community-spirited mother.

"We have, over the life of our Trust since 1970, always supported a segment of the arts sector, as my late mum Rua had a passion for the arts," says Lee.

One organisation they are particularly passionate about is the Auckland Philharmonia Orchestra, and for the last 18 years they have supported the APO through its Chair Donor programme.

Sponsoring First Violin Mark Bennett's position in the orchestra for such a long time has enabled Lee and Penny to not only make a philanthropic impact, but to also build up a special relationship with both the organisation and the musician.

APO's Director of Development Susan Wall says, "Over [the last 18 years] they have become cherished members of the APO family, and an integral part of our future. As Chair Donors, Lee and Penny enjoy a unique and close relationship with both the orchestra and their musician, violinist Mark Bennett."

Next year is the 50th anniversary of the Rua and Clarrie Stevens Charitable Trust being established, which was resettled as a fund with Auckland Foundation in 2015.

Lee and Penny are both looking forward to celebrating this very special anniversary year, and continuing their close relationship with the APO.

Lee adds, "Locally our longest receiving recipient is the APO. In my experience, they are certainly a leading role model for how grantees could manage their funding partnerships."

SHAKTI'S VITAL WORK

Social services provider Shakti is highly regarded in the community for the vital work it does ensuring the safety needs of vulnerable women and children from Asian, African and Middle Eastern refugee and migrant backgrounds.

Although well-known for its women's refuges and intervention/prevention programmes, Shakti is also very active in the youth space. Its Shakti Youth Network for Change (SYNC) project, which is led by youth for youth, seeks to empower young women to break free from inter-generational cycles of violence.

Thanks to a grant from the Grassroots Giving Programme, SYNC were able to provide a Youth Support Caseworker/ Women's Advocate to support and empower vulnerable young women experiencing family violence and culturally sanctioned abuse. More recently Youth Coordinator Mengzhu Fu was a recipient of one of the first Women's Fund grants, to run leadership training for young migrant and refugee women.

Shakti's Funding Coordinator says they've been seeing more and more young people approaching SYNC and seeking its services over the last two years

"Through SYNC we want to empower youth to become catalysts for the social change needed to prevent of family and gender-based violence, inter-cultural bullying and other forms of discrimination. The young women who participated in the leadership training were not only empowered with the skills to discuss migrant and refugee youth issues with their wider communities, but it helped to build their confidence and validate their sense of belonging as migrants."

KIWIS PAY IT FORWARD

Cold, damp houses are known to be a significant problem for many Kiwis during winter, and the risk of ill-health is particularly high for the very young and the elderly. So when the government introduced its Winter Energy Payment on 1 July 2018, it was intended to help low income households and superannuitants with the cost of keeping their homes warm and dry.

Some are fortunate enough to not need this additional payment with their NZ Super however, and so, in a first for Auckland Foundation, a new "Super Warm Fund" was set up as an easy way for superannuitants who could afford to donate their Winter Energy Payment to do so - and help a household in need.

"Auckland Foundation aims to make it easy for those who don't need this extra help to keep warm to redirect the payment to one of the many Kiwi families who do."

Partnering with The Salvation Army, donations were directed to households that The Salvation Army had

identified as needing the most help with heating costs. Thanks to generous New Zealanders across the country, 56 individuals and families were able keep their homes warm over winter.

Community Ministries Programme Coordinator Jodi Hoare said that the demand for The Salvation Army's services during winter is often compounded by increasing electricity costs.

"With living costs continuing to rise, it is very difficult for many people to manage over winter. Many of our clients are struggling to keep up with current expenses, while others who come to us are in arrears. The Super Warm Fund has been very empowering for many, by helping to support people and families in crisis with their electricity costs [and] has made a significant, positive difference to New Zealanders' lives."



The Women's Fund: celebrating our change makers.

These 12 months have seen the Women's Fund continue to establish itself as a recognised and unique force for good.

A programme of networking events provided our generous donors with the opportunity to connect and learn, as well as introduce others to the concept of the Women's Fund. A wonderful supporter has emerged in Duncan Cotterill, who has graciously hosted these events.

In the 125th anniversary year of women winning the right to vote, the Women's Fund also made its first ever grants. To honour the original spirit of our suffragists, we celebrated the women change makers striving to make change in Auckland's communities.

A specially organised Retreat Day saw 42 women change makers come together for a day of reflection, support and learning, before the announcement of the 10 grant recipients. Chosen by our donors, these grants were made to a wide range of community work, from empowering refugee and migrant women to drive safely and legally, and helping young women to learn resilience and selfefficacy skills, to encouraging young teachers to gain a qualification to further their career and reducing social isolation for migrant women through shared food and storytelling experiences.

We're delighted to see other community foundations embrace women's giving. Women's funds are now

established in the Waikato, which has also made its first grants, and in Christchurch, with plans to launch in Wellington and Timaru underway.

Here in Auckland, it been wonderful to see the Women's Fund gain recognition. Auckland Foundation won the "Governance Innovation by a Not-for-Profit" category at the 2018 Women in Governance Awards, and six months after making the first Women's Fund grants, we were recognised with the Vodafone Innovation in Grantmaking Award at the Philanthropy New Zealand Awards.

Looking ahead, we now move into the second phase of the Women's Fund its growth phase.

Only by driving donations can we ensure that funds will be available to specifically tackle issues that affect women and girls, particularly those who are socially and economically disadvantaged.

Auckland Foundation is extremely proud to be seen as leading by example, and is excited at the significant potential to make an impactful and meaningful difference for our women and girls.


ALISON SUTTON
